

### PRESENTATION OF THE ORGANIZATION

**NJK** is a non-profit organization and charity offering intervention programs to Nunavik youth since 2014. The organization offers three different nature and adventure intervention programs: Nurrait, Ikaartuit and Tuttuit. The principles of transparency, integrity, safety and respect for Inuit culture are guiding all of our action.

### Mission

To promote the personal and social development of youth in Nunavik through outdoor intervention programs.

### Values

We believe in commitment, solidarity, empowerment, positive influence and investment in the youth of Nunavik.

### Vision

We believe that by reconnecting with nature, with themselves and with others, young nunavimmiut will be better equipped to fulfil their potential.



### THOSE WHO MAKE THE ADVENTURE POSSIBLE

This year, we would like to recognize all of the people who make our programs possible, even though they are not part of the coordinating team. In 2022-2023, these 36 wonderful people devoted 3804 hours to their involvement with NJK. #### Local guides

The land is a lever for healing and reconciliation for the Inuit. Our outdoor intervention approach respects, values and uses the land as a tool to encourage positive changes in youth lives. The promotion of activities on the land, when done properly with Inuit leaders, is culturally adapted to the needs of participants.

This is why we always hire community members to guide us in the field, insisting on the importance of involving and consulting them. It is essential for us to leave space for traditional activities, guided by these knowledge bearers. We believe that no-one knows the ancestral territory better than they do, and we want to showcase their knowledge while enabling an exchange of information between the local guides and the participants.



### TEAM LEADER TRAINING

In order to offer culturally appropriate nature and adventure intervention programs, it is essential that those in contact with the participants have certain common ground. This training, presented and refined since 2018, was offered at the **NJK** cabin in Kuujjuaq for three days in autumn 2022 to bring together the people involved in our programs. We covered the basics of intervention through nature and adventure, winter camping and cross-country skiing techniques, the art of leading cooperative games, reflective feedback coaching and much more. The workshops created a sense of community and gave volunteers and trainees the experience they needed to deliver the programs in their respective communities. By properly training the people who work in the organization, we ensure that our programs are culturally appropriate, safe and in line with our mission and values. This greatly enhances the experience of the participants.



### OPERATIONAL SUMMARY


On the field, 2022-2023 marks the return to normal for **NJK**'s activities. The end of the health restrictions in Nunavik has allowed us to relaunch each of our large-scale programs. It took a lot of work to get back into the pre-pandemic rhythm. This effort was greatly facilitated by the close contacts that the coordinators were able to maintain with the field, the volunteers, the guides and the participants.

There was an abundance of activity in the field. Outings of several nights' duration, bringing together a large number of communities, became possible once again. The *Tuttuit* professional interns have completed a three-year development cycle, and we are preparing for a new cohort next year. Finally, the activities of the *Ikaartuit* program are continuing this year. We have begun to look at ways of developing this program and increasing its impact on the target populations.



### CHANGE ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

About governance, Joshua Nathan Kettler, a former participant who has been on the Board for a year, stood for the role of Vice-Chairman. The members elected him unanimously. Judith Naluiyuk was also elected for her first term as a director. She has been involved as a guide in our programs since 2019. Their election to the Board confirms our healthy governance and contributes to our offer of culturally adapted nature and adventure programs. Maintaining a positive democratic environment remains a priority for all members involved in the organization.


### SPENDING OVERVIEW



The majority of our expenses are spent on field activities and programs, which makes us happy and proud, as we are responding directly to the needs of our participants. This percentage of 71%, compared with 55% the previous year, is explained by the return to regular activities after a particular pandemic situation. The most significant increases were in the salaries paid to local guides and the travel expenses incurred by our teams to ensure a presence on the ground. These provide unique support to local teams, as well as taking part in organizing local activities such as overnight camping trips and ensuring a presence during regional expeditions.

In addition, in order to improve the experience of participants and set up more successful interventions, we have decided to invest in training for team leaders and coordinators. This will help to improve sharing and understanding of the intervention tools available and the foundations of nature and adventure intervention. In this way, more energy and time in the field can be devoted to the fabulous youths taking part in the activities of our various programs.

### INCOME STATEMENT



We are pleased to note an increase in the amount allocated by the Nunavik Regional Board of Health and Social Services (NRBHSS), which has been a strong partner for several years. Makivik, through its Ungaluk Safer Communities program, remains a pillar for the implementation of our programs. A positive net profit of 2.64% was achieved this year. This result can be explained by two main factors: on one hand, the donations recorded demonstrate the growing support we are receiving. Secondly, our healthy and rigorous financial management assures our partners that every dollar is spent for the benefit of participants.

### NURRAIT

The Nurrait program takes the form of extracurricular activities in Nunavik's primary and secondary schools. It is delivered mainly by teachers and support staff from Kativik Ilisarniliriniq.

The 2022-2023 edition of the Nurrait program was a return to normality. Throughout the school year, we were able to be active in 13 communities. In addition to the many weekly activities offered, the local teams organized 15 overnight camping trips. These experiential outings are essential nature and adventure intervention activities. The youth learn to support each other as a team, while achieving a group objective and their individual goals. The most highly motivated among them took part in one of the three regional expeditions organized in March and April.

The Initiation section of the program has been expanding in Nunavik's primary schools. It gives the youngest students an introduction to the activities offered by **NJK**. Every year, we have noticed a growing interest in this part of the program. We are convinced that this is a chapter that we will be developing even further over the coming years.

### IKAARTUIT

For the third year in a row, in partnership with the Sanajiit program and Kativik Ilisarniliriniq, we offered a socio-professional integration course to youth in vulnerable psychosocial situations. This year, the course took place in Aupaluk, on the Ungava Coast. For three weeks, one psychosocial worker, one coordinator and one field facilitator from **NJK** combined their efforts to intervene, ensure the well-being of the participants and help them develop adaptation strategies. Supported by two carpentry teachers, they built a cabin located about ten kilometres from the community. Through this construction project, the participants were invited to learn to identify three driving forces, set goals and develop at least one meaningful relationship. They also had to identify two elements of commitment to the projects and identify successful coping strategies for their situation. Of course, they also learnt the rudiments of carpentry over the three weeks!



In the summer of 2022, eight participants took part in an intervention sequence that involved kayaking down the Koksoak River. After two days of initiation on the periphery of the community of Kuujjuaq, they set themselves the challenge of descending 70 km of the river.

The common goal was to get closer to the territory, discover their strengths and create a sense of community within the group. With a personal goal in mind, they all volunteered for the *lkaartuit* program.

Annie-Claude Roberge took part in the expedition as director. This magnificent short film will introduce you to these participants and help you understand the power of intervention through nature and adventure.

Events are planned in Nunavik communities to broadcast *Ikaartuit*. A public link will be available in the coming months so that the general public can watch it.

### TUTTUIT

The Tuttuit program is offered to youth who want to become professionally involved with **NJK**. Mainly former participants in the *Nurrait* program, they are called upon to lead the *Nurrait* team in their community. They can also take on a bigger challenge, an outdoor summer project that they have to set up for themselves!

#### **ASSISTANT TEAM LEADER INTERNSHIP**

Tuttuit interns are assistant team leaders. During the year, they work closely with their team leaders to take charge of the Nurrait team in their community. They must assume certain responsibilities. To equip them properly, we offer development workshops on various topics: group facilitation, risk management, leadership and professional development.

#### SUMMER LEADERSHIP TRAINING COURSE

This year marked the third and final year for the first cohort to take part in the *Tuttuit* program's summer leadership courses. Initially planned as a two-year cycle, we revised the formula along the way due to delays caused by health restrictions. This year, the final challenge was to canoe from the Hudson coast to the Ungava coast.

The big difference between this expedition and the one offered as part of the Nurrait program is that it is entirely organized and set up by the *Tuttuit* participants, accompanied by the program coordinator. In preparation for the trip, they were able to learn the basics of project management, such as managing a budget, keeping deadlines and long-term planning.

### WHAT'S TO COME

### Nurrait

Activities that include the participant's entourage in order to consolidate the protective factors of the participants and encourage the commitment of their entourage.

Implementing an effective and rigorous recruitment process for volunteers.

Improving the management and recognition of the volunteers involved.

### Ikaartuit

Offering the socioprofessional integration project in Salluit and building bridges with local stakeholders to encourage community involvement.

Offering the nature immersion course in Kuujjuaq by inviting yout from all over the Ungava coast.

Setting up a new pilot project to develop and broaden the horizons of the program.

### Tuttuit

With the significant improvement in Internet service in Nunavik, offering monthly remote follow-up of internships to each intern.

Recruiting a new cohort over 3 years for the summer leadership course.

Overall, we want to reach out to the community and implement consultation strategies. It is also one of our objectives to implement new human resources and administrative policies to ensure proper staff management and promote the long-term retention of team members. Finally, we are already starting to prepare the celebrations for our 10th anniversary, which are coming up fast and of which we are deeply proud!
